Yoshiro and Yoshio Taniguchi

Yoshiro Taniguchi was an architect born in Kanazawa City who received the Order of Culture. His son, Yoshio, is also a renowned architect who designed the Gallery of Horyuji Treasures of the Tokyo National Museum and the Museum of Modern Art, New York.

The Museum of Architecture, Kanazawa, was designed by the son, Yoshio, and built on the land of the house his father, Yoshiro, used to live in.



The museum has a faithful replica of the Akasaka Palace Japanese style annex "Yushintei" s main Japanese style room and tea house that were designed by Yoshiro Taniguchi, along with an exhibition area, a museum shop and a café. Visitors can enjoy a view of the Saigawa River and the city center over the water garden.


